Chief's Report

- Chief James Eriksen recapped the August 2020 LE Activity Report
 - Discussion of the 18 crashes that occurred in August (July had 13 crashes)
 - Chair Marker requested a review of the 18 crashes in August to determine how many involved excessive speed

Old Business

- Shred Day is scheduled for October 10, 2020. The point of contact for this event is Chair Steve Marker and Vice Chair Russell Williams. Chief Eriksen e-mailed the MCSO Reserve Coordinator to inquire if a Reserve Deputy can be present during this event. An article about the event was published in the September 2020 Fairview Point. There will be no food donations accepted due to the global pandemic restrictions from the Oregon Food Bank.
- For proposed events that can be sponsored by PSAC, Deborah Aaronson suggested either the City or Neighborhood Watch create a video or add to the City's website information about surveillance cameras. This could include how to install and the different types of cameras available to the public. Also discussed with the recent mailbox thefts and ways to prevent these crimes that could be included in the video and/or website. The Committee would have to take any proposals to the City Council for review and approval.

New Business

- COVID-19 – A short discussion about the global pandemic and the current "phase" Multnomah County is in.
- Discussion of the patrol hours memorandum created by Chief Eriksen (patrol hours spent in the City based on the GPS from the police computers from June 2019 to July 2020).
- A review of the Reimagine Oregon discussion that occurred at the Fairview City Council on September 16 (Chair Kafoury and Commissioner Stegmann discussed the proposals from this organization). Councilor Forsythe summed up the meeting and requested the City Council to be more involved in discussions that could impact changes to the Sheriff's Office.
